Locked In But Not Locked Out

49 - Ephesians: Rise Up & Walk Church on the Park Live | Sunday, 29 March 2020

Text: "He will cover you with His pinions, and under his wings you may seek refuge; His faithfulness is a shield and bulwark" (Ps. 91:4).

Theme: You may be locked down and locked in, but God's Kingdom is open to you.

Intro: You may be locked in your home but you're not locked out of God's Kingdom. God's Kingdom is like the Promised Land—a land flowing with milk and honey. And this Kingdom is your Promised Land. God's Kingdom is not just a future reality but a present one. The doors of God's Kingdom are opened now and you can enter through faith. In this Promised Land, God reigns and his presence permeates the atmosphere. Again, the door is open for you to enter in, enjoy and abide there. Jesus is the door and the way; He keeps you from being locked out of God's Kingdom.

1) Be locked into God (John 3:3, 5).

- In this time, where people are **locked down** and **locked into** their homes, be **locked into God**.
 - Our Father is our **only hope** now.
- In Australia, we have a TV show, the Millionaire Hot Seat.
 - People are often **unsure** of what to answer—either A, B, C or D. But they need to commit. And when they commit they say, '**Lock it in, Eddy.**'
- You may be **unsure** of God and Jesus.
 - But now you are **seeing your need.**
 - This is a time to lock in your relationship with God. Don't be toying around. Put your trust in him.
- Jesus is knocking-don't lock him out.
- Welcome Jesus into your life.
- Jesus is knocking on the door of your home—don't lock him out.
- Welcome Jesus into your home.
- Jesus said, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is **born again** he cannot **see** the **Kingdom of God**...Truly, truly, I say to you, unless on is **born** of water and **the Spirit**, he cannot **enter into the Kingdom of God**" (John 3:3, 5).
 - Everyone needs a spiritual birth—a new life. And this new life happens when you welcome Jesus—who is life itself—into your life.
 - Again, he is the doorway into the Kingdom.
- There's a scene in **the Chronicles of Narnia, Prince Caspian**, where the two brothers and two sisters are at Strand train station. All of a sudden, **their world fades** and **the strange new world** of Narnia appears. They enter in.
 - God's Kingdom is like this strange new world of Narnia and God's is calling us to live in his new world, not the old which is passing away.
- This Kingdom is greater than the kingdoms of this world.
 - Though, our world's kingdoms are **shaking**, when you are in God's Kingdom you will be **unshaken**.
 - God's Kingdom is high above, unaffected by our problems.
 - Of course, it is moved in **compassion** by our problems, but it's not **shaken** by our problems.

2) Jesus longs to bring you under his wings (Luke 13:34-35).

• Let's go back to our study of Psalm 91:1-4.

- ישָׁב בִּסְתֵר עֵלִיָוֹן בִּצֶל שַׁדִּי יִתְלוֹנָן:
 - Yoshev b'seter el'yon, b'tsel shadai yit'lonan

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- "The one who dwells in **the secret place** of the Most High, in the shadow of the Almighty will stay" (*my translation*).
- Notice that in this place—God's secret place—he covers us with his feathers and we find refuge under his wings (vv. 1-4).
 - Let's **compare** this to what **Jesus** says.
 - "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem...How often I wanted to gather your children together, just as **a hen gathers** her brood **under her wings**, and you would not have it! Behold, your house is left to you desolate; and I say to you, you will not see me until the time comes when you say, "**Blessed is he** who comes in the name of the Lord!" (Luke 13:34-35).
 - Observe: Jesus wants to gather you under his wings of protection.
 - But Jerusalem was unwilling.
 - In **70AD**—about 40 years later—all of **Jerusalem collapsed** and their **temple** was **destroyed**.
 - They were looking to a physical temple for refuge rather than the real temple— Jesus.
 - Put your name in this verse: 'O Glen, Glen...'
 - Put your city in this verse : 'O Brisbane, Brisbane...'
 - Put your nation in this verse: 'O Australia, Australia...'
 - By inserting your names here, you will hear God's heart.
 - In Hebrew, the last phrase, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" is 'Baruk

haba b'shem Adonai' ברוך הבא בשם יהוה.

- Try to say it with me.
- This phrase communicates a great sense of welcome, joy and celebration of the one who comes in the name of the Lord, which is Jesus.
- · It's not an apathetic response. Neither, is it a sarcastic, "O, look who is here!"
- Instead, it's a genuine appreciation of Jesus the Sent-One.
 - And today, he's knocking on the door of your home and life.
 - Will you say, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"?
- This virus is all about Jesus coming into your home and being hosted in your home.
 - He's knocking on your door; don't lock him out.

3) The Most High has established a hidden lair for his lions (Ps. 91:9).

- I want to bring out some more **insights** of **Psalm 91** from the **Hebrew**.
- And I want you to keep this verse in mind, "The wicked flees when no one is pursuing, but the righteous are bold as a lion" (Prov. 28:1).
- Now let's continue to read Psalm 91:5-10.
 - There's great promises in here that we should hold on to.
 - But I want us to focus on verse 9.
 - The Hebrew reads different than the English version.
 - The English emphasises what **you do**, but the Hebrew focuses on what **God has done** and **established**.

- "For you, O Yahweh, are my refuge; O Most High, you have established your hidden lair" (*my translation*).
- The word 'hidden lair' is what fascinates me.
 - The Hebrew is used in **Nahum 2:12** as the hidden lair of lions.
 - Or, we can say, 'the lion's den.'
- This is what our Most High has established: a hidden lair for his lions.
 - These are his righteous people, who through being in his presence are as bold as lions.
 - They are **conquerers**, rather than those **conquered**.
 - They don't see themselves as the ones always under the devil's attack.
 - Instead, they see themselves as the ones on attack.
- The Father is raising up lions in this time. These are those who hide in his hidden lair—far above the storms of this earth. I believe the Lord says, "They come out of my lion's den with

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authority and boldness to do my works on earth. They have learned to dwell and therefore can do my works with great power." Let's be dwellers in the Most High's secret place.

- We've talked about the **hope** of his calling. We've meditated on the **riches** of His glory. Now, we need to **know** "what is the **surpassing greatness of His power** toward us who believe... far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and **every name that is named**, not only in this age but also in the one to come..." (Eph. 1:19-23).
- Isaac was one of these men-righteous and as bold as a lion (Gen. 26:1-17).
 - He dwelt in a place that others were fleeing from.
 - He dwelt there because God said, 'stay'.
 - "Now Isaac sowed in that land [the place of the famine] and reaped in the same year a hundredfold. And the LORD blessed him" (Gen. 26:12

Conclusion: When you are locked in to God, you are not locked out of the Kingdom. The hope of the Kingdom, the riches of the Kingdom and the power of the Kingdom are yours.
